

Colorado National Guard activated for arctic blast, assisting civil authorities at warming centers

DENVER – With an extreme cold front bearing down on Colorado, Governor Jared Polis signed an executive order authorizing the support of up to 100 Colorado National Guard members to assist civil authorities at warming centers across the Denver metropolitan area and Boulder, Colorado, Dec. 20, 2022.

In less than 80 minutes from the time of notification, the first 25 Colorado Air National Guard members volunteered and were prepared to begin onboarding to augment state emergency response efforts at the Denver Colosseum near downtown Denver.

"I love serving," Task Force Arctic Commander U.S. Air Force Maj. John Moreland said. "I like moving and motivating troops, and I like to be able to assist those who may not otherwise have the service or help we're about to provide."

In 2021, just before the New Year's holiday, the CONG was activated to assist at the Marshall Fire in Boulder County, Colorado.

"During the holiday season, the members of the Colorado Army and Air National Guard are here to help the people of Colorado in times of need, such as the extreme weather event we are about to experience," said 140th Wing Commander U.S. Air Force Col. Christopher Southard. "As Citizen Airmen and Soldiers, we are always ready to support our community members in times of need. It's an honor to serve our community when called upon."

During COVID-19 relief efforts in 2020, over 130 service members aided people at shelters in Denver as part of a CONG task force named Shelter Support.

This year, the holiday season began not with heat from a rapidly moving wildfire, but an extreme cold front with a wind chill expected to hit near -50 degrees in some areas around the city. Less than 24 hours after receiving the call, the activated CONG members were mission ready and stood by to assist people seeking shelter.

"The Colorado Guard is assisting ... [people] whose resources aren't as plentiful to not have to bear all of the hardship that comes along with the elements, the cold, and the freezing temperatures," Moreland said. "Everyone here is a volunteer. They did not have to be here for this mission and so I would say that morale is high, they want to be here, and they believe in what it is we are doing."

Whether assisting with food service duties, directing foot traffic, checking people into the shelter, or just listening to someone's story, the Guard members of Task Force Arctic took advantage of every situation to develop relationships,

build knowledge, or just lend a hand when times are tough.

"Opportunities like this in our domestic operations portfolio always present an opportunity to exercise leadership skills that you may not otherwise be exercising," Moreland said. "I think this is a great season of the year to spread holiday cheer so-to-speak, to show love, to show kindness ... I'm excited about being here, and I think its safe to say that all the troops are also."

Before the day was over, the state emergency operations center granted requests for support at an additional four locations, and another 25 CONG members would answer the short notice call.

"Be it fires, floods, rescue operations ... the Colorado National Guard is always ready, and we are present wherever and whenever we are needed," Moreland said.

UTA Weekend Daycare

GREAT NEWS for our <u>Service Members who are assigned to or working on Buckley SFB during UTA weekends</u>. The Buckley SFB Family Child Care (FCC) program is offering free certified in-home care for children ages 2 weeks to 12 years, in either on-installation housing or in civilian communities for service members on drill weekends. The groups are multi-age and smaller ratios than in the centers.

Free childcare on UTA weekends is available for Single Service Members, Dual Military Service Members, and Service Members who have spouse that works outside the home on drill weekends, they will provide their work schedule.

The point of contact to register for this childcare is:

If it is the first time requesting this care, Service Members should submit the attached form at least 1 week prior to drill. If the member does not currently use the CDC, they will require a few additional documents such as, spouse proof of employment (if the member has a spouse), an immunization record, and their drill calendar.

Once the child is registered, they are good to go for the year and will only require a phone call or email request for care NLT the Wednesday prior to drill month.

Additionally, please contact Ms. Wynnie Wahlfeldt if you know of anyone that wants to be a FCC Provider, the Buckley SFB Family Child Care (FCC) program is looking for more providers. This is a great employment opportunity if the family member needs to be at home. Buckley SFB will provide all the equipment and tools to get them started with their own home business.

140WG GP/Commanders and Senior Enlisted Advisors 2022 End of Year review:

OG: You want to see a Group execute the mission at the highest level consistently throughout the year? We did and this is the proof. The Operations Group deployed to Prince Sultan Airbase, Saudi Arabia, for just over 3 months, where we flew 3219 combat hours over the course of 569 sorties and employed 2,000 rounds of 20 millimeter, 7 laser guided rockets and 55 precision guided weapons to kill hundreds of ISIS fighters during the Hasakah prison break, and defend coalition forces in Iraq and Syria. We deployed to Miramar in support of the Marine F-18's for two weeks to conduct dissimilar basic fighter and air combat maneuvering while also executing 35 incentive flights for our Wing members in recognition of their selfless service and outstanding dedication. We added to that 35 with another 32 incentives during the months of October and November. We deployed a 4 ship again to Fallon in support of Navy Top Gun where our pilots dominated wannabe Mavericks in the mighty Block 30. We smoked the Readiness Exercise Evaluation, surge flying out of 3 separate locations, the ACC Standardization and Evaluation inspection, and the Alert Forces Operational Assessment conducted by 1st Air Force. All this was conducted while also manning the 24/7 alert mission in defense of Colorado and the United States. Things aren't going to slow down as we continue to prepare and train in 2023. BANG!

MXG: 2022 captured another remarkable year for the 140th Maintenance Group. The deployment to Air Force Central Command in support of Operation Inherent Resolve showcased the professionalism and dedication of our maintainers as they sustained a high-level <mark>of aircraft</mark> availability, both downrange and at home-station. The deployed 140th ops/maintenance team executed over 550 sorties, totaling over 3,000 hours of mission time, and lead the way with the 378th Air Expeditionary Wing's first hot Integrated Combat Turn, utilizing multi-capable Airmen from four career fields. The ops/maintenance team demonstrated downrange Agile Combat Employment (ACE) in two exercises: SPEARS OF VICTORY, where we built a unique nation-state partnership as the first American unit to participate in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's inaugural Flag event. The team also executed AGILE SPARTAN, running a joint service/joint partner exercise with the United States Marines and the Royal Saudi Air Force, which the Combined Forces Air Component Commander ACE Cell cited as the best ACE unit seen to date. The 140th MXG authored the playbook for Total Force Integration success; the active association partnership with the 383d Fighter Squadron strengthens our organ<mark>iz</mark>ation and h<mark>elps</mark> increa<mark>se</mark> the n<mark>umber</mark> of tr<mark>ain</mark>ed fighter pilots available to our Combat Air Forces. Despite multiple challenges (older F-16s that break more often, decreasing aircraft parts availability, and an unreliable depot schedu<mark>le</mark>) the superst<mark>ars of the 140th MXG are le</mark>veraging the Th<mark>eo</mark>ry of Constraints to optimize aircraft ma<mark>int</mark>enance practices and increase daily aircraft availability. As we move into 2023, MXG leadership remains focused on building force de<mark>v</mark>elopment <mark>opportunities</mark> throughout t<mark>he</mark> group and stre<mark>n</mark>gthening our culture and values of mutual r<mark>es</mark>pect, inclusivity, teamwork, and excellence.

233 Space Group – 2022 saw unprecedented operations across the Space Group. The MGS was activated in support of the Russian invasion of Ukraine and will likely remain on status for the foreseeable future. Additionally, MGS was deployed in support of USSTRATCOM exercise Global Thunder in February and our newly developed super FPAK CONOPS was tested in June with its deployment to Wyoming during AFT. Lastly, the Group received formal notification that we will take on portions of the MGS follow on mission: S2E2 (SBIRS—Survivable and Endurable Evolution) in partnership with the United States Space Force Delta IV. Lastly, Colorado Lieutenant Governor Diana Primavera, TAG, staff, and industry professionals visited Greeley Air National Guard Station and received an orientation to the 233d mission and Colorado Guard service member contribution to national security.

The 138th Space Control Squadron "Ghostriders" were deployed on an out-of-cycle deployment to the AFRICOM Area of Responsibility. This deployment was within 7 months of their last 6-month deployment in 2021. Additionally, the 138th participated in multiple exercise to include Neptune Falcon, a joint exercise that included Air Combat Command and U.S. Space Force assets, where the Ghostriders became the first electromagnetic warfare unit in the Air Force to

connect to the Range Closed Loop Environment, demonstrating critical capability for combatant commanders. Finally, the 138th enjoyed a personal visit from Colorado Governor Jared Polis, where he received a 233d Space Group mission brief and increased situational awareness of the Space National Guard initiative in deliberation in Congress. Additionally, the Combat Training Schoolhouse (233d Det 1) graduated 30 guard personnel from 4 states (CO, FL, CA, and HI) with certification in Space Electromagnetic Warfare operations. Our training capacity provides an essential qualification means for Air Force and Space Force electronic warfare professionals in continual demand to defend the national security interests of the U.S., its allies, and its partners.

MSG: In 2022 the 140 MSG team showcased their far-reaching critical capabilities through expertly supporting multiple large-scale undertakings, to include: the PSAB deployment, SSP engagement, Miramar TDY, Ukraine Humanitarian mission, and alert missions. More specifically, in support of our Space GSUs, we established the first ever mobility warehouse for the 233d SG. Additionally, we integrated with the CO Army National Guard's Cyber Protection Team at Exercise Cyber Shield to partner with the Slovenian Ministry of Defense at Exercise LOCKED SHIELDS ensuring full validation for Slovenia which helped make us EUCOM's #1 choice to provide cyber expertise to a new SPP candidate Malta, planting the seeds for further U.S. integration. We were also #1 in all of ANG Combat Arms for qualifications and personnel trained which aided us to dominate CONG's Best Warrior challenge where six members completed the three-day competition amassing four individual event awards and the "Best Warrior" crown. Furthermore, the 140 MSG had a significant role in the Wing's Readiness Exercise Validation, were we deployed wing personnel to set up a base camp at the Agile Combat Employment site in Nebraska, as well as training, directing, and managing the 140th Wing's Emergency Operation Center. Finally, for the first time ever, the 140 MSG took home the NGB "Distinguished Mission Support Group Plaque" showcasing our efforts as one of the top five MSG's in the nation! Looking forward to 2023, we are excited to continue the momentum and deliver premier support for mission execution anytime, anywhere.

MDG: The 140th Medical Group has had a fantastic year! Our CERFP conquered EXEVAL after a year plus of arduous combined training events and exercises. Our State Partnership Programs continued to grow with both Slovenia and Jordan. We worked along-side Slovenia during multiple Role II events and as they took over as the framework nation for the Balkan Medical Task Force. Jordan expressed the need for a critical care infrastructure, and we built a team to help them move forward with that goal. Our Medical Support Squadron made sure the Wing was fit to fight as we processed multiple ACE missions and deployments as well as participated in the REV, which all were huge successes. We look forward to all the experiences and challenges that 2023 will bring.

<u>WGS</u>: In 2022, the Wing Staff supported our returning Deployers by providing both events like the Strong Bonds program in addition to a variety of counseling services. At the same time, they've kept their focus on the future, planning and executing an incredible midpoint exercise in the REV, earning multiple 'valid yeses' for the Wing. They've helped keep the force sharp in assisting in the execution of 80 ACA events and beginning to modernize our Electronic Records Management system. Finally, they've helped the Wing continue to grow, both literally and metaphorically, by conducting and guiding us through the DEOCS survey as well as bringing in over 150 new team members to share our journey with us.

240 CEF: Calendar year 2022 saw 240th members travel to Alaska and Wake Island for critical infrastructure assessments and provided USSF master planning and programming for space launch capability at Cape Canaveral. Unit members were embedded with 7AF staff for Ulchi Freedom Shield in Korea, the largest peninsula-wide exercise! One of our members is currently serving 365-days in Poland to standup an infrastructure PMO. Another member is providing fulltime critical GIS capabilities to the Colorado fire watch team. As the year closes, our members sustain customers directly for CO JFHQ, SAF, PACAF, EUCOM and SPACECOM. Calendar year 2023 will see the 240th CEF expanding OPLAN tasked exercise engagement in INDOPACOM, boots-on-ground advancement of PACAF second island chain infrastructure and increased end strength manning.

Employer Support of the Guard and Reserves recognizes three Colorado Freedom Award winners

For the first time since the Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve was established, three Freedom Awards were presented to Colorado employers for their support of members of the National Guard and Reserve.

An ESGR banquet, typically held in Washington, DC, was hosted in Larkspur, Colorado, Nov. 11, 2022, and brought together the three Colorado company's CEO's and their nominees to receive their prestigious awards.

"It goes to show that Colorado is a very supportive state for their military personnel," said U.S. Air Force Col. Michael Bruno, deputy chief of staff for the Colorado Department of Military and Veterans Affairs.

Bruno emphasized that the award winners look out for their employee service members especially during deployments and that the ESGR helps recognize how exemplary the employers in Colorado are.

"The ESGR's goal is to recognize, educate, and mediate," Colorado ESGR Chairman, Mark Hennessey said.

ESGR actively supports the employee's civilian employment, educates the employers on the systems in place to protect the service members, and mediates between the employers and employees to ensure service members are appropriately supported correctly to the needs of the service member.

ESGR hosts military and employer outreach programs in over 54 states and territories. There are an average of 2,300 nominations from all branches of the military annually. Only 15 awards are given each year and of those only five are Freedom Awards, encompassing three different employer types: small, large, and public.

The Colorado winners represented each category this year which raised special attention from ESGR.

"Currently, employers know that military men and women aren't just good hires, but great hires," ESGR National Chairman Ron Bogle, said. "They are team driven, mission accomplishment focused, show up to work, work well in diversity, and they are focused on getting the job done." Bogle was appointed by U.S. Secretary of Defense Mark Esper. "It's very important to get the message out to encourage employers to take care of military members while they take care of the mission. That's paramount," said U.S. Air Force Command Chief Master Sgt. Todd Scott, individual mobilization augmentee to the senior leader at U.S. Space Command, Peterson Space Force Base, Colorado Springs,

Colorado. "I appreciate everything the ESGR has done to facilitate these awards to these companies and I'm sure that there are so many other companies that are doing a great job. We will continue to get the word out." Scott was activated to help set up the Space Force during the COVID 19 pandemic's first stages. "My employer was very supportive in that they made sure that my family was taken care of and my benefits were still there. They also made sure that my work team was also taken care of as well," he said. "This is a way to give back to the employer and recognize them for how well they have take care of their military employees."

Wyoming National Guard's 153rd Maintenance Squadron Commander, U.S. Air Force Maj. Joshua Eveslage, nominated his employer the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office. Eveslage is a traditional guardsman with three overseas deployments, while also serving as a county patrol sergeant for the last 17 years.

"They go above and beyond," Eveslage said. "They took care of my house, watched my dog, and built a fence for another deployed member."

He stated that his employer also meticulously submitted pay matching paperwork so that his retirement wouldn't take an income hit. A process that normally becomes overlooked and increasingly stressful on deployed members.

U.S. Navy Captain, Commander, Tom McAndrew, Navy Reserve Space Command headquarters, recently deployed to assist with the U.S withdrawal from Afghanistan. "The experience that I had was unbelievable," he said. "Being the CEO of a hi-tech cyber security company and then 90 days later being a part of the largest human noncombatant evacuation in history is a testament to what we do here. The mission could not have happened without the National Guard and Reserve."

McAndrew is also a Freedom Award-winning CEO recipient at CoalFire, a Cyber Security Company. The Freedom Award is the highest recognition given by the U.S. Government to employers for their support of their employees who serve in the Guard and Reserve. He believes the country needs us to make sure that the best and brightest in the civilian sector also continue to stay relevant in the military.

Each year, on the third Monday in January, the Department of Defense joins the nation in honoring the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

King is remembered as America's preeminent advocate of nonviolence and a leader of the Civil Rights Movement. While others were fighting for equality by "any means necessary," he used the power of words and acts of nonviolent resistance. King's achievements are well documented.

However, few people know of the history and connection he had with the island of Bimini in the Bahamas. King chose Bimini because it was where his friend, politician and civil rights reformer Adam Clayton Powell, Jr. had a home. Artist Tommy Saunders worked as a personal assistant for King during his visits.

Meanwhile, Tommy's older brother Ansil, a boat builder and champion bonefisher, became King's guide and friend. He would take King to secluded parts of the island where he could be alone with his thoughts. Like King, Ansil Saunders is a deeply religious man, and the two quickly bonded over their faith.

During one visit to Bimini, King wrote notes for his Nobel Peace Prize acceptance speech, which he gave in Oslo in 1964.

In 1968, King returned to the island Saunders, again, found a quiet place on Bonefish Creek, where King would write his final speech, "I've Been to the Mountaintop."

Saunders shared in a later interview, his conversation with King. He said, "He told me 'You know, Ansil, I don't think I'll make 40 years old." He went on to share, "We didn't have time to fish because he wanted to just write at that time. He came to Bimini to feel peaceful."

On April 4, 1968, days after returning from Bimini, Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee.

The Defense Department recognizes that freedom, equality, and inclusion are true force multipliers and imperative to the national defense and the strength of our nation. Dr. King recognized the power of service. Observing MLK Day through service continues the DoD's mission of promoting change and building communities.
